SPRINGTIME CHEER to friends in Bohodukhiv, UKR

This is an invitation for Unami to participate in **"Springtime Cheer,"** a letter-writing campaign to once again, put smiles on the faces and hearts of people who live in Bohodukhiv, UKR, near Kharkiv and the Russian border. Boyertown, PA and Bohodukhiv, UKR were Sister Cities officially until about 2010.

The intention of **"Springtime Cheer"** is to simply reach out in a human-to-human, heart-to-heart way and let the recipient know that you are thinking of them, wishing for an end to the war, etc.

If you are writing a note, maybe you could share share a bit about your life (age, school, pets, family, hobby). Keep in mind that everyone in this town is under great stress in so many ways, and we do not want to make them even more sad by telling them about our houses, cars, vacations, etc.

A few suggestions:

1. Send a colorful greeting card and hand write a brief message. Dollar Stores have cards for \$.50. Printing might be best, keeping in mind that many older people do not read English.

2. You could write a brief letter, keeping in mind that children usually start learning English at about age 13. Maybe you'd embellish the paper with doodles, drawings, etc. Be creative!!

3. Adult artists and those who might have an adult coloring book. . .color a page and make it into a greeting card!

4. We hope that children will draw springtime or happy pictures of their choosing. Place in a plastic sleeve for protection. A first name and age on the back would be great. We are hoping for many drawings from children!

4. Tuck the flap of the envelope into the card; do not seal. On the outside write "To a (woman/man/child) from a (woman/man/child) age_____.

4. For your personal security, we suggest you sign with your first name only. Do not include your address. Perhaps "Your friend in America" and name would be appropriate.

5. Deliver all cards and letters to Linda Weinberger, 1270 Creekside Lane, Quakertown, PA. 18951 by March 31. If you are local there will be a box on my front porch beginning March 15 and you can put your letter in there.

6. **In the Boyertown area,** deliver all cards and letters to 232 Shaner Street, Boyertown. One block away from the State Theatre, last house on the right, box on the porch, Ukrainian and American flags displayed.

7. For UNAMI MEETING. . .there will be a box in the Meetinghouse to deposit cards, letters, drawingson March 19 and March 26.

Hearing from Lenape --About their wishes to return to their Homeland here.

You're invited for an evening of listening and fellowship as we welcome the Lenape of Oklahoma to the Mennonite Heritage Center on Wednesday, April 12 at 6:00 p.m. It begins with a potluck meal followed by a presentation from our guests. **The event is free, but registration is required here**: <u>https://mhep.org/events/event/hearing-from-the-lenape/</u>

The Mennonite Heritage Center is located at 565 Yoder Rd., Harleysville, Pa, with the event occurring in the barn.

Seating is limited to 135 people.

The Lenape/Delaware are returning to memorialize the one-year anniversary of returning some of their ancestors' bones held in museums back to local soil. They have been in conversation with a number of groups (Perkiomen Middle School, Ursinus College, a group of individuals across the Delaware Valley of Mennonite, Quaker, and other backgrounds) about a dream they have for more burial ground and a place where their young people can be on the land, perhaps learning the culture of their ancient forebearers. This event is a further conversation.

Unami Meeting for Worship, Discussion, and Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business

We're open, again!

With joy and thanksgiving we open the meetinghouse to you. Out of respect for those vulnerable among us to a COVID infection or ineligible to receive a vaccination at this time, we require masks to be worn at the beginning of all meetings at the meetinghouse (except toddlers and babies). If you've forgotten your mask, please help yourself to one on the foyer table. After the start of the meeting the convenor will ask if any of the attendees are uncomfortable with masks being removed. If all are comfortable then masks may optionally be removed during the meeting.

In the meetinghouse, we are using OWL technology to provide a Zoom link to those friends worshiping at a distance so that we can all be in the same room of the Spirit. Sit wherever you want, respecting social distance.

If you have a message, please move to the seat with a print scarf draped over it so that the OWL can pick up your message and broadcast it. Feel free to remove your mask in order to be heard clearly; thank you for replacing it after you speak.

At close of meeting before the pandemic, our tradition has been to shake hands and some to hug. At present, some of us bow and greet each other at a distance, some elbow bump. Please do what you feel is safe for you and expect that however clumsily we greet each other at close, we are nevertheless expressing peace and goodwill. We will routinely introduce ourselves so that all on Zoom or in the meetinghouse can be one gathered community.

We will have a program for children on the third and fourth Sundays of each month. Please contact First Day School committee member Linda Weinberger if you plan to bring your children at any other time. Your children are welcome in the meeting room for the first 15 minutes of worship as you choose. After that, someone will rise to usher them out for activities indoors or outside.

Meeting for Worship with a Concern for Business begins in hybrid form is on every second Sunday at 9 a.m., followed by Meeting for Worship at the usual time: 11:00 a.m.
